- Conducted our August general membership meeting in person

But even through the disruptions we have all experienced these past 18 months, your TLPOA Board has managed the following activities without interruption to keep our lakes as healthy as possible:

- East Twin aeration program
- West Twin Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM) treatments
- Lake monitoring as part of the Michigan Cooperative Lake Monitoring Program
- Water clarity studies

Your TLPOA Board believes that all property owners on our beautiful lakes should be TLPOA members to help protect the significant investments we all have for enjoying a lakefront experience. As such we conducted a membership campaign this past summer in an attempt to increase our membership. I am happy to report that we successfully recruited 66 new TLPOA members, 21 of which joined at the Lake Steward level. One of the new projects we are working on involves the reduction of excess phosphorous into our lakes. I would encourage you to read the article in this newsletter detailing the considerations your TLPOA Board is making regarding this project.

While our general membership has grown over the past year, the number of TLPOA Board members continues to dwindle. The Aeration Program Fund (East Twin) is in need of donations and recommended amount is based on lakefront property frontage. Donations to this fund are restricted, meaning money donated to the fund can only be used for that program.

Membership dues help pay for everything else including lake studies and tests such as the Water Clarity Project. Dues also fund all the general fund line items shown above in the financial report.

Your membership and your generous donations are what enables the TLPOA to provide those programs and activities focused on maintaining healthy lakes so the lakes can be enjoyed for generations to come.

CONSIDERATIONS FOR REDUCING LAKE PHOSPOROUS LEVELS

Four years ago the TLPOA Board, under the leadership of Board Member John Jackson, initiated a project to identify causes for the gradual degradation in water clarity in East Twin Lake. Two causes have been identified to date that are believed to be the primary culprits:

- 1. **Lakeshore erosion** resulting from high water levels over the past several years.
- 2. **High phosphorous levels** entering the lake from precipitation runoff.

Fortunately, the water clarity in East Twin this past season has been much improved due to shoreline improvements by many of our lakefront property owners and much lower than average amounts of snowfall and rainfall early in 2021. These in turn have significantly reduced erosion and precipitation runoff into the lake, the two primary factors in reduced water clarity. However, we don't expect lower than average precipitation levels to continue indefinitely, thus continued diligence in efforts to improve water clarity is still needed.

Efforts being taken to date by the TLPOA Board to improve water clarity can be summarized as follows:

- Education of our TLPOA membership on the value of natural shoreline management which can reduce shoreline erosion. Healthy and natural shorelines reduce the amount of soil and nutrients entering the lake, the ingredients that cause reduced water clarity.
- Supporting walleye stocking by the MI DNR that maintains a healthy lake food chain by controlling the level of microorganisms in our lakes which can affect water clarity.
- Phosphorous reduction in the water entering our lakes from runoff during periods of high precipitation. Note that a healthy level of phosphorous and nitrogen is beneficial for our lakes. But high levels of phosphorous promote algae growth which in turn reduce water clarity. Our lake monitoring efforts through the MI Cooperative Lakes Monitoring Program (CLMP) have shown a slight continuing increase in overall phosphorous levels in East Twin Lake.

It is encouraging to see many new natural shoreline projects being implemented by our membership which can only improve the quality of our lakes. With respect to phosphorous reduction, two new technologies presented at the August TLPOA Membership Meeting have been identified that can reduce phosphorous levels in our lakes.

EutroSorb: These are bags of phosphorous absorbing material placed on the lake bottom in areas where water with high phosphorous content flows into our lakes.

Phoslock: This is a material that resides on the lake bottom in areas of high phosphorous content to inactivate the phosphorous before it can increase the phosphorous levels in the larger lake area.

These technologies have been used effectively in numerous lakes in the United States including Houghton Lake and Morrison Lake in Michigan.

Your TLPOA Board is considering contracting with PLM Lake & Land Management Corp to apply EutroSorb and/or Phoslock in the following high phosphorous locations identified on our lakes:

- East Twin Lake canal
- Retention Pond overflow location along the East Twin Buttles Road road-end
- Culvert between East and West Twin near Fleming Road

Rest assured that your TLPOA Board will fully evaluate the use of these technologies to ensure they can be safely used with no detrimental impacts to our lakes and which will meet all state environmental requirements before finalizing any plans.

WEST TWIN LAKE EURASIAN WATERMILFOIL TREATMENT UPDATE

Eurasian watermilfoil (EWM), an aquatic invasive species, was first discovered in West Twin Lake back in 2014. Since EWM is nearly impossible to completely eradicate once it is introduced into a lake, herbicide treatments each season is the best way to control it. Your TLPOA Board continues to manage these herbicide treatments through use of qualified contractors.

PLM Lake and Land Management has been our EWM treatment contractor since 2017. In 2021, PLM applied the following herbicides in June, July, and August at specific EWM identified locations.

- ProcellaCOR/DIquat
- Renovate OTF more commonly referred to as Triclopyr
- SculpinG more commonly referred to as 2,4-D

All these herbicides are fully approved by the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) and pose no danger to swimmers or the lake fish population. Total cost for all three treatments was \$4,941 consistent with our 2021 EWM budget of \$5,000.

The good news is that through the generous contributions of our TLPOA membership in past years, our EWM restricted fund still has a healthy balance of \$98,426 which more than covered our 2021 expenses. As such, we are not requesting EWM restricted fund donations from our membership for 2022. Equally good news is that EWM has not yet been found on East Twin Lake.

2021 ANNUAL GREENBELT & CHICKADEE AWARDS PRESENTED



The Greenbelt Award is presented to property owners who exemplify good shoreline practices to help protect our lakes from shoreline erosion and chemical runoffs. This year's recipients are Ron and Gerri Compton of West Twin Lake. In the photo at left, Ron is pictured on the right standing next to Tom Conquest, TLPOA President. Ron is holding a framed photo of his lakefront property which was presented to him by the Board.

The Chickadee Award is presented to a member who has done extraordinary work towards our mission of keeping our lakes healthy. The 2021 Chickadee Award recipient is Jim Morphey on East Twin. Jim received the award for both his outstanding shoreline erosion prevention project and his continued efforts at staying abreast on technologies and processes being used to protect other lakes. Jim was unable to attend the membership meeting in August, but was presented the trophy subsequently. The picture at right shows a section of Morphey's shoreline project which he recently undertook.

LIGHT POLLUTION CONCERNS RAISED AT MEMBERSHIP MEETING

Concern was raised at the August membership meeting over the increase in lighting around the shorelines. The concern cited how lighting detracts from being able to see the wonderful night sky. More importantly, lighting could ultimately be harmful to the health of a lake. In the May, 2013 newsletter, we shared an article from Scott Brown of Michigan Lakes and Streams on the subject which included a story by Roger Carey called "LIGHTS". Parts of this article are contained below.

The negative effects of light pollution are numerous. Economically, wasted light is wasted money. The International Dark-Sky Association figures about a third of outdoor lighting is wasted because of poorly designed and inefficient fixtures. Estimates in the U.S. alone are the annual price tag for "misdirected light" is \$10 billion.

In terms of public safety and crime, experts say more light is not necessarily better. Fixtures that reduce light pollution can actually make lighting safer by reducing what's known as disability glare. This type of glare occurs when bright light scatters within the eye making it harder to detect contrast and harder to see people lurking in shadows. It also can allow criminals to better see what they are doing. Motion activated lights can help reduce both light pollution and criminal activity.

Wildlife and plants are also affected. For example, nighttime lighting can confuse animals that migrate (like moths and migratory birds), can modify predator-prey relationships and can even alter competitiveness within the same species. In the case of moths, it has been discovered that numerous flowering plants declined in numbers when the flight paths of pollinating moth species were affected by light pollution.

As for lights located on shorelines, it is believed that zooplankton may stop feeding on algae if the lighting is too strong. Excessive algae growth causes an increase in bacterial activity and can lead to oxygen depletion in a lake. Depleted oxygen often results in many species of invertebrates and fish dying of asphyxiation.

Perhaps the concerns raised at the membership meeting were also raised over the fact that misdirected lighting reduces drastically the ability to view the **night time sky**. Those of us who lived or still live in highly populated areas can attest to the fact that there are far fewer stars visible in those areas than there are "Up North." The major contributing factor: misdirected lighting which makes it nearly impossible to see the Milky Way or to view annual meteor showers.

It's always been so wonderful to share the glorious view of nighttime skies with others, especially those visitors (friends and family) who don't ordinarily have the opportunity because of where they live.

Hopefully, all of us will review our lighting practices and take steps like turning off lights whenever you can, and using light fixtures that only direct lighting downward, not up into the beautiful dark skies.

By the way, the next two prominent meteor showers are:

Leonids: November 3 through December 2, with peak times on November 17 & 18.

Geminids: November 19 through December 24, with peak times on December 13 and 14.

Those of us who find it difficult to lie outside face up (preferably in a zero gravity recliner) when it's cold outside should mark our calendars for the **Perseids**Meteor Shower, scheduled for the period July 14 through September 1, 2022. The peak times are August 12 and 13.
